Working as a professional set decorator for film and television in Chicago and L.A.—highlights include The Bluer Brathers and The Untowcholos—she gained an encyclopedic knowledge of design periods and the ability to create spaces to best suit the characters in each project. Now working as an interior designer, Alan can absorb the personalities of het clients and grow with them through their aesthetic ebbs and flows.

In the case of the clients whose historic singlefamily home interiors she designed in Winnetka, the partnership originated in 1994, long before the family had grown from two to—presently—four. "One day we wandeted into Jean's store on Damen Avenue," explains the husband. "The relationship developed over the years, beginning with a small purchase [from her store]. Jean has a very unique approach to design that speaks to us."

What speaks most clearly is the collective love of adventure, it seems. So when the family needed assistance renovating their home on the North Shore, they called Alan, and the trio dove right in-starting with the formal dining room. The exploit began with a trip to Antique Resources in Lakeview to snag an 18th-century English Regency dining table. The couple committed on the spot. "They just went for it," says Alan. "Finding that table was such a gift." The solid, 36inch mahogany insects that can come and go depending on the size of the party were an added bonus. "They are able to have a six-down dinner for 20 people with that table!" exclaims Alan. "It's such a unique piece."
